Most fuel indices are considered at average levels for this time of year but those indices are slowly climbing due to the persistent high pressure system producing record heat in the area.**

Expect lower daytime RH minimums as the atmosphere dries and there is less cloud cover. Temperatures will trend downward toward seasonal norms after Sunday. <p>12 hours: <b>Fire activity will continue to be minimal and limited to smoldering and creeping. The fire area will receive additional bands of rain.</b></p>
<p>24 hours: <b>intermittent Wet weather will continue to limit fire spread, activity and escalation. Heavy fuels will continue to burn out within the interior of the fire.</b></p>
<p>48 hours: <b>Fire activity is expected to be minimal due to cooler temperatures and cloud cover. No additional fire growth.</b></p>
<p>72 hours: <b>Continuation cooler weather should help to limit any spread or incident escalation.</b></p>
<p>Anticipated after 72 hours: <b>After the weekend the weather will remain cooler with unsettled conditions and the potential of additional rain.</b></p>

Strategic Objectives (define planned end-state for incident):</p> <p><b>Keep the fire north of State Route 38 to prevent the fire from spreading into the San Gorgonio Wilderness and recreation facilities.</b></p> <p><b>Keep the fire south of San Bernardino National Forest Boundary to protect Big Bear Lake and Big Bear City.</b></p> <p><b>Keep the fire east of Clarks Grade to protect the Bear Creek watershed and Snow Valley ski resort.</b></p>
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**Keep the fire west of Forest System Road 2N93 and State Route 38 to protect the Santa Ana River watershed and the communities of Erwin Ranch, Lake Williams, Burns Canyon, and Rim Rock.**

**Safety for firefighters and the public through hazard recognition and application of the risk management process. Protect property, both public and private, including the following areas: Communities of Big Bear, Big Bear Lake, Baldwin Lake, Moonridge, Sugarloaf, and Boulder Bay. California Spotted Owl PACs, cultural resources, Wilderness Areas, Class 1 airsheds and heritage resources. Mitigate the spread of Covid-19 using best practices precautions. Integrate with cooperating agencies. This is a full suppression incident and the incident will use roads, ridges, and fuels treatment areas as holding opportunities to keep the fires as small as possible.**

**Overall strategy will be to continue with direct line where possible and continue to limit the overall fire footprint. Steep rugged terrain. Local technical specialists will assess cultural resource sites if possible, prior to engagement, and in the planning process to identify categories of archaeological sites, and recommend appropriate level of protection. Fire managers will consult with archaeological resources advisors assigned to the incident to minimize direct and indirect impacts. Numerous threatened and endangered plants as well as designated Critical Habitat occur from Bear Mountain east to Sugarloaf Mountain. Additional areas of Critical Habitat occur in meadow habitat west of the fire. Protect property, improvements, and infrastructure on the private lands adjacent to the forest. Incident overhead will strive to develop and maintain relationships with the cooperators and stakeholders while working toward the continued improvement of those relationships. The Sugarloaf Inventoried Roadless Area is east of the fire at Staircase Canyon continuing east along the ridge of Bear Mountain and Sugarloaf Mountain. Creation of dozer lines is not authorized within the IRA without appropriate approvals.**
